

Counting in Spanish

TEACHERS: For years I taught children to count in Spanish using only the registration period. At the beginning of each year, I gave each child their number in the register - 1 to 30+ - and asked each child only to remember their own number and who they followed in the register. I then asked them simply to run through the numbers to answer the register. By Christmas, every child in the class could count in Spanish to 30 or more. Simple! (And it's quicker!)

16	dieciséis	33. treinta y tres
17	diecisiete	Forty is cuarenta, so 41 is cuarenta y una – the same as with 30.
18	dieciocho	40. cuarenta
19	diecinueve	41. cuarenta y uno
20	veinte	42. cuarenta y dos
21	veintiuno	Fifty is cincuenta. Follow the same rule. Then carry on through the tens.
22	veintidós	50. cincuenta
23	veintitrés	60. sesenta
24	veinticuatro	70. setenta
25	veinticinco	80. ochenta
26	veintiséis	90. noventa
27	veintisiete	100. ciento
28	veintiocho
